Data centers are extremely resource-intensive facilities. They require massive amounts of electricity 24/7 and use large volumes of water for cooling. With utility bills already rising for residents and small businesses, Monterey Park cannot afford a project that could further strain our power grid and water supply or contribute to higher costs and reduced reliability.

The environmental impacts are also serious. Increased energy demand from a data center leads to higher greenhouse gas emissions, especially during peak periods when fossil fuels often supply the grid. These facilities also create constant noise from industrial cooling systems and backup generators, and they typically rely on diesel generators that can release harmful pollutants during testing or outages—affecting local air quality for nearby homes, schools, and parks.

Beyond that, there are real quality-of-life and community costs. Construction would likely bring extended disruption—dust,

I'm also worried that the infrastructure upgrades required for this kind of project—such as substations, transmission lines, and expanded water or cooling systems—often end up being subsidized by taxpayers or passed down to ratepayers. Our residents should not shoulder higher costs or diverted public resources to support a private project that does not serve the public interest.

For all of these reasons, I urge you to reject the proposed data center or, at the very least, require it to undergo rigorous environmental review and thorough community impact assessment before any approval is considered, with full transparency and clear, ongoing communication to residents throughout the entire process. Monterey Park deserves development that strengthens our neighborhoods and improves residents' quality of life—not a facility that consumes scarce resources, increases pollution, and leaves lasting burdens on the community.

As a resident of Monterey Park since 2017, and software engineer for nearly 15 years, I must voice my opposition to the proposed data center project on Saturn Street, near Hillcrest Elementary School. I understand that we live in exciting times of technological advancement, and that the idea of developing a data center in Monterey Park may sound prosperous. However, the lack of oversight and transparency around AI and AI data centers, and the effects it has on our communities, is dangerously overshadowed by its insurmountable demand and unregulated use.

I encourage you to take the time to research the adverse effects of data centers powering AI, which consume massive amounts of resources and drive new forms of inequity. Karen Hao, AI expert and investigative journalist, offers a lot of insight in her recent interviews and NYT bestselling book ([1] <https://karendhao.com>, [2] <https://youtu.be/8enXRDIWguU?si=3SGiUF2XOO7iFbSe>, [3] <https://youtu.be/e70RT6c01M8?si=ZSXiAkTwQLAEEsT>).

Data centers cause environmental, social, and economic harm to surrounding communities. This proposal makes me particularly concerned for our home in Monterey Park, and I strongly feel the following detrimental effects should be understood and considered ([4] <https://medium.com/@Jobey/ai-data-centers-are-consuming-massive-resources-and-driving-new-forms-of-inequality-karen-hao-a88a5d19273f>):

Water Consumption

- Data centers use enormous amounts of water for cooling servers. Each AI data center can consume millions of gallons of clean water daily to prevent overheating.
- Communities near these data centers face water scarcity, while corporations receive priority access. For example, in Arizona and Iowa, residents complained about declining groundwater levels linked to nearby AI data centers.
- The use of potable water for server cooling in water-stressed regions, while local people lack access, is a stark symbol of digital inequality.

Energy Use and Carbon Footprint

- According to the environmental impact report, the data center will drain the electrical grid, the equivalent of powering 55,000 homes, and require regular testing and maintenance of 24 diesel generators.
- AI training requires enormous computational power. Training one large model like GPT-4 can consume as much electricity as 120 American homes use in a year. Power

demand from hyperscale data centers has forced governments to reconsider coal or gas plant closures in some countries.

- A green inequality is created, where wealthy tech companies monopolize renewable energy contracts, leaving less for local infrastructure.
- The benefits of AI (wealth, automation profits) are concentrated in Silicon Valley, while the environmental costs (pollution, energy burden) fall on local communities hosting these centers.

Land Use and Local Displacement

- Rising land prices push out smaller landowners, while municipalities offer tax incentives to big tech – effectively subsidizing corporate expansion.

Economic Inequality and Labor Divide

- Most AI profits go to engineers, investors, and executives – not to the regions or workers supporting the infrastructure.
- Tax breaks for data centers don't always translate into better wages or public services.
- Communities bear the environmental and infrastructure costs without proportionate economic benefit.

As a Monterey Park resident in Council District 1, I am writing to express my strong opposition to Item 10B, the proposed data center at 1977 Saturn Street in Monterey Park, on the December 3, 2025, City Council Meeting agenda.

In communities across the country, we have seen that data centers suck up a vast amount of energy and water, pollute and restrict access to clean water, and raise utility costs for residents while simultaneously making neighborhoods harder to live in. With current technology, there is no realistic way to operate an environmentally friendly data center, regardless of planned mitigation strategies.

This data center would operate 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and use three times more electricity than what the entire city uses now. This will inevitably strain our electrical grid, to say nothing about the other environmental impacts.

In 2020, at the peak of COVID, my neighborhood lost power for a day and a half in the middle of a heat wave. My parents and I were effectively stuck in our home in sweltering heat, unable to use fans, lights, or even our refrigerator for fear of our food spoiling. Since then, we've had smaller outages almost every year. How much more frequent will these outages be once this data center starts competing with residents for electricity? And will our electricity costs increase such that we won't even be able to afford to turn on our air conditioning anymore?

Data centers also consume staggering amounts of water to cool their systems. What measures will be put in place to ensure that our access to clean water will not be threatened or limited?

I have read the materials that have been uploaded to the City's website about this project, but they contained thousands of pages of technical and legal jargon that did not provide clear answers to these questions. My parents, like many others in this city, are immigrants with limited English proficiency. I cannot even imagine how they would understand those documents.

I urge you to not only require a full Environmental Impact Report (EIR), but to also find ways to communicate the findings of that report in plain language and in multiple languages to the public so that we can all know what is at stake. Please prioritize the health, safety, and needs of Monterey Park residents over a data center that could destroy our quality of life.

The result is an outsized industrial presence that alters neighborhood character and land use without delivering a meaningful, ongoing public return.

Finally, projects of this scale often require major infrastructure upgrades—new substations, expanded transmission capacity, and water or cooling system improvements. These upgrades are expensive, and too often the financial burden is shifted to taxpayers or ratepayers rather than being fully absorbed by the developer. Monterey Park residents should not be asked to subsidize a private facility that does not clearly serve the public interest.

For these reasons, I urge the city to reject the proposed data center. If decision-makers are not prepared to deny it outright, then the minimum standard must be rigorous environmental review and a comprehensive community impact assessment before any approval is considered. This process should also be conducted with full transparency and consistent, clear communication to residents at every stage. Written Communication I am a Monterey Park resident and constituent, and I am strongly opposed to the proposed data center. This development does not serve the interests of our community, and it would impose lasting harms that outweigh any limited benefits.

To begin with, a project of this kind would place a heavy burden on local resources. Data centers operate nonstop and demand extraordinary amounts of electricity and water to function and to keep equipment cooled. At a time when residents and small businesses are already facing steep utility increases, Monterey Park should not take on a facility that could intensify pressure on our power grid and water supply, risking higher costs and reduced reliability for everyone else.

Equally concerning are the day-to-day environmental and health impacts. The constant power draw of a data center increases greenhouse gas emissions, particularly during peak demand periods when energy generation is most carbon-intensive. These sites also produce continuous industrial noise from cooling equipment and backup systems. And because many data centers rely on diesel generators as emergency power, routine testing or outages can release pollutants that degrade air quality for nearby homes, schools, and public areas.

The community impacts extend beyond utilities and emissions. Construction would bring prolonged disruption—heavy truck traffic, dust, vibration, and street congestion. After construction, the facility would require relatively few permanent employees, meaning job creation is minimal compared with the scale of the project. In practice, Monterey Park would be left with a large, fenced, industrial complex that changes neighborhood character and land use without providing a comparable public return.

I am also concerned about the infrastructure expansions that typically accompany developments like this. Upgrades such as new substations, expanded transmission capacity, and additional water or cooling systems are costly, and too often those expenses are shifted to taxpayers or ratepayers rather than fully absorbed by the developer. Residents should not be asked to subsidize a private operation that offers little direct benefit to the public.

For these reasons, I urge the City to reject the proposed data center. If the City is not prepared to deny it outright, then at minimum the project must undergo rigorous environmental review and a comprehensive community impact assessment before any approval is considered, with full transparency and clear, ongoing communication to residents throughout the process. I am writing as a deeply concerned resident to urge you to reject the proposed data center at 1977 Saturn Street. Recent developments and mounting evidence only strengthen the case AGAINST allowing this massive industrial facility to be built in our community.

The project is led by an overseas investment firm with no direct accountability to Monterey Park residents. There is no clear, enforceable promise that they will address health or environmental harms if they occur, raising urgent questions about long-term responsibility and transparency.

I've heard that one concern is that the area will be rezoned for affordable housing and that some people don't want to see this happen due to outdated stereotypes about what happens when affordable housing is built. This stereotype, however, cannot be used to justify siting a pollution-heavy, industrial project adjacent to homes. The data center adds far greater risks than residential neighbors and sidesteps the real issue: protecting families from exposure to industrial hazards.

The air-cooled system touted by developers may reduce water contamination risks but does nothing to eliminate the air pollution, diesel emissions, and climate burden. California's own research shows that health impacts from data center pollution have tripled in recent years, with diesel backup generators directly harming children, elders, and medically vulnerable residents via increased respiratory and cardiovascular risks.

Industrial-scale data centers bring persistent noise, increased heat, and low-frequency vibrations, degrading the quality of life far more than typical business uses. These impacts extend well beyond what a residential or even commercial development would impose.

Proximity to a major transmission station may suit the developer's needs but also brings more industrial hazards into a densely populated neighborhood that is already grappling with environmental issues and heightened wildfire vulnerability.

I've also heard some compare this project to EV charging and that's just incorrect.

The data center's energy demand to home EV charging comparison is misleading; EV growth is tied to renewable energy investments, while this data center locks the region into fossil fuel consumption and pollution for decades.

We demand that you:

Reject the Mitigated Negative Declaration.

Require a full Environmental Impact Report, including comprehensive analysis of air quality, noise, environmental justice, and public health risks.

Mandate robust emission controls, clean energy commitments, and a clear accountability framework before any approval is considered.

Prioritize meaningful, multilingual public participation and prioritize community health, safety, and resilience over short-term industrial convenience.

Monterey Park deserves responsible development — not a facility that locks us into pollution, undermines equity, and sacrifices our quality of life for outside investors.

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Dear Honorable Mayor and Councilmembers,

I am writing to you in my personal capacity. As a lifelong Monterey Park resident, I am opposed to the data center proposal for the well-documented environmental and economic harm such projects cause to surrounding communities.

I ask that as you consider this proposal, you ensure the answers to the questions below, among others, are publicly available and easily accessible to residents.

Economic Considerations

1. The City will receive an estimated \$5 million/year in tax revenue from the data center, according to the staff report. How was this calculated, and under what economic conditions? What do the projections look like if the economy (40% of California's growth in 2025 powered by AI's rise) drastically changes due to an AI bubble burst?
2. If the data center were to fail as a business, what mitigation strategies are in place to ensure the property doesn't become a superfund site with the presence of diesel, batteries, cooling chemicals, etc.?
3. Is the City providing any tax incentives for the developer? If so, what and how was that determined?
4. How will this development impact residents' SCE rates? Have any studies been done to estimate its potential impact on SCE customers?

Environmental Considerations

1. The Water Use Efficiency in the Initial Study/MND is calculated at 0.0. This calculation does not seem to account for water usage in the data center's closed loop cooling system. How many gallons of water will the closed loop cooling system use, and how often would it need to be flushed out and replenished?
2. How will the water district treat the closed loop cooling system's water when flushed? What will that cost, and will that cost be passed onto rate payers?
3. The data center will have 24 diesel generators. What sort of mitigation strategies will the developer utilize to ensure that if/when diesel leaks, it does not contaminate the ground soil?
4. What is the **maximum** amount of time the generators would be allowed to run for testing and maintenance? In parts of the Initial Study, it states that SCAQMD regulates this at no more than 50 hours/year per generator, but in other parts of the report, it indicates that generators can be tested for "no more than 13 hours per day." What is the

enforcement mechanism for SCAQMD to enforce their limit? (If a fine, how much, and will that be a negative incentive to the developer to follow regulations?)

5. What constitutes an emergency to allow for use of the diesel generators? Is there a cap on how long the data center can use the generators during a long-term emergency?
 1. For example, what happens when there is insufficient capacity (caused by heatwave, power plant goes down, natural disaster, etc.) For how long could the data center use their generators, and what would the impact be to air quality, noise, and cancer risk if generators are used for a longer term emergency?

Given the vast harm data centers are causing across the country, it is critical that the City Council consider all of the risks involved in moving forward with such a project.

If you are not able to outright oppose the project at this time, please direct staff to conduct a full Environmental Impact Report so that the City and its residents are fully aware of the potential consequences of this project.

When it was shared that the Saturn Park Advisory Review Committee was formed to discuss how the vacant buildings sitting in the lot I drive past everyday, I followed the agenda and minutes closely, though I never had the opportunity to physically attend. I was pleased, however, to know that mixed-used development, housing, and an open space were being considered, and the [final report from SPARC](#) made it seem as though these options remained on the table. Proponents of this disastrous project may argue that people like me should've spoken up sooner at these meetings, but while we cannot change the past, we are certainly speaking up now -- and many of us are.

I am writing to express my opposition to Item 10B, the proposed data center at 1977 Saturn Street. I urge the City not to approve or advance this project without extensive community input and a full Environmental Impact Report (EIR).

The proposed data center is less than a mile from a vibrant residential neighborhood home to hundreds of families and La Loma Park. I am deeply concerned about the health impacts that will directly impact this community and the city as a whole.

Data centers have been linked to a plethora of health issues: Researchers at University of California Riverside have recently announced (as of November 25th, 2025) that the health impacts from the pollution data centers in California produced have tripled from 2019 to 2023 and that number could rise by another 72% by 2028.
