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Dear Mayor and City Council,

I am a proud Monterey Park resident and homeowner, **living just 1.5 miles** from the proposed data center site, and a Google AI Engineer working on Generative AI technologies since 2023. I have over a decade of experience leading software engineering teams globally. My views are my own and do not represent those of my employer. My statements are long; however, I encourage you to read this. I have taken extensive care in this email to **help you understand the some of the key technical risks that this project represents for our community.**

ASK: Based on my extensive professional experience working firsthand in this area, I urge the Council to deny this data center permit.

Because of the unique technical requirements of generative AI compared to regular data centers, the current environmental study (MND) is inappropriate and insufficient.

- The project treats this like a traditional data center. However, generative AI requires specialized high-density hardware that consumes vastly more power and generates exponentially more heat. **This facility is projected to use more electricity than the rest of Monterey Park combined.** The 'Mitigated Negative Declaration' does not sufficiently account for the strain this puts on our local grid or the likelihood of our backup plants being forced into service more frequently, which degrades air quality for the entire San Gabriel Valley. **I demand a full EIR to study the specific impacts of high-density AI workloads.**
- From a technical standpoint, cooling AI clusters requires massive, high-velocity fan systems that run 24/7. These fans produce a persistent, low-frequency hum. Standard noise ordinances often measure 'A-weighted' decibels, which can miss the specific low-frequency vibrations that penetrate residential walls and cause sleep disruption and stress. The city must require a specialized Low-Frequency Noise Study before this moves forward.
- Finally, this project includes 24 massive diesel generators. In the AI industry, we know that as power grids become more strained, these generators are tested more frequently. The MND dismisses the health impact of these emissions, but for those of us living downwind, this represents a significant increase in particulate matter. A project of this scale and technical complexity requires a full Environmental Impact Report (EIR), not a shortcut study.
- **This project is projected to use more electricity than the rest of the city combined (unmitigated demand of ~434 million kWh/year).** This puts an unfair strain on the local grid and **WILL** lead to outages and utility hikes for residents.

There is no precedent for a data center this close to residential communities in all of Southern California. By approving this, you would follow a dangerous new trend of 'Residential Encroachment' that has caused health and noise complaints in every other city in the US that has tried it.

- As a Generative AI Engineer, I know the importance and criticality of harnessing this technology usefully and properly, especially choosing responsible and correct placements for data centers. There are many better places much more suited for this sort of data center away from residential areas that are already water-starved.
- In Southern California, data centers are typically located in strictly industrial or commercial corridors, such as Downtown LA (One Wilshire), El Segundo, Irvine, and Santa Ana. However, the 1977 Saturn project is a rare and controversial attempt to place a high-density, AI-grade facility directly adjacent to a residential community. **While many data centers exist in SoCal, almost none share a direct property line with single-family homes in the way the Monterey Park site does. Those facilities are appropriately sited in high-intensity industrial zones with specialized power infrastructure and no direct residential neighbors.**
- For example, El Segundo has over 15 data centers. However, these are almost entirely located south of the airport an area with very few residents and massive existing industrial noise from the airport. El Segundo's centers are buffered by major boulevards and commercial office parks. The 1977 Saturn project lacks this buffer, placing industrial-scale cooling and diesel generators significantly closer to bedroom windows. **We are a residential community, not a buffer zone for an Australian REIT's industrial asset.**

Finally, we see can already see the costs Virginia has paid for becoming "Data Center Alley":

- **Residential utility rates have jumped over 30% in some areas directly due to data center presence.**
- **A 2024 study by UC Riverside and Caltech linked data center diesel permits in Virginia to 14,000 cases of asthma symptoms and an estimated \$300 million in healthcare costs.**
- Monterey Park's reliance on groundwater makes this project significantly more dangerous than it would be in a city using surface water. **In Virginia, a data center drawing 20 million gallons of groundwater annually caused significant local water pressure drops for nearby residents.** Showers turned to trickles and appliances failed to fill. As heavy industrial pumping lowers the water table, residential wells must draw from the "bottom of the barrel," which often contains higher concentrations of sediment and salts. This can damage home plumbing and require homeowners to install expensive new filtration systems. In groundwater-dependent areas, this has led to the revocation of housing permits for actual residents because there simply isn't enough water left in the aquifer.

I urge you, please do the right thing for Monterey Park.

I noticed that South Coast AQMD issued an analysis of air quality impact of the Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) on December 3, 2024. The link to the document is here: <https://www.aqmd.gov/docs/default-source/ceqa/comment-letters/2024/december-2024/orc241106-01-mnd-1977-saturn-data-center-project.pdf>
